Dear Dr. Arian,



You must be very happy to have your mother with you again. I was particularly pleased when her certificate arrived. She was the envy of all the unfortunate people who were in the office.

Conditions are getting worse and worse here for the Jews. I dread to think of the misery and suffering they - especially the older people - will have to face next winter. Their funds are running low, and they do not know where they will find accomodation. The quota is a calamity, especially in these days of rabid persecution and permanent cold pogrom.

The courage and fortitude of the Jews are beyond praise. They have our profound admiration.
